Get your fill with the Soroptimists

f you're not full enough from the

holiday delicatessen and specialty foods you ate, there's still plenty to be eaten this weekend in Tuolumne. Soroptimist International of Twain Harte offers clam chowder, pasta, salad, bread and all-you-caneat crab for \$35 per person at the club's annual Crab Feed Saturday.

According to Crab Feed Co-chairwoman Patt Koral, funds from the dinner go toward scholarships for Summerville High School students in addition to various activities and nonprofits like a self-esteem workshop for eighth-grade girls to help them adjust to high school, Habitat for Humanity, the Center for Nonviolent Community, the Watch Program, breast health causes and backpacks for area schoolchildren.

"It's extremely important to help some children who don't have the financial resources available," Koral said. "It's not a handout, just a hand up. It's a way to help kids who may need an extra little push."

Koral said that in the past, the scholarships have helped students attend anything from four-year universities to two-year community col-

leges and vocational schools. Students will also help out with the event. The Bears Service Club at Summerville High has partnered with the Soroptimists, the Lions Club, and the Rotary Club and members will serve at the Crab Feed.

Koral said she joined Soroptimist International – a women's organization dedicated to improving the lives of females internationally and locally - when she moved to the Twain Harte area in 1999. She has spent two terms as president and currently serves as co-chairwoman for the feed alongside Stephanie McCaffrey and Diane Dunigan, who owns The Rock in Twain Harte, the restaurant that will provide most of the food for the event.

"I just really love being with these women," Koral said. "They're a wonderful bunch of

women. I loved the idea of being able to get involved."

Koral said the Crab Feed sells out every year. The Twain Harte Rotary Club started the event several years ago and

ran it for four years before members decided to back out; Soroptimist International of Twain Harte picked up the event four years ago.

"It's been profitable for our organizations," Koral said. "We've been able to give more scholarships and help out the community, give out more money."

The doors to the Tuolumne Veterans Memorial Hall open at 4:30 p.m. and dinner is served from 5:30 to 7 p.m. No outside beverages



are allowed inside, but soda, water, beer and wine will be available for purchase. Tickets are \$35 and can be bought at El Dorado Savings (near the Arch) or at Umpqua Bank in Twain Harte. Call Koral at 928-1616 for more information.
